LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Poets.

Another quiet month has passed but we've been planning for events further down the line.

First, we've fixed the date of the Annual General Meeting for March 20th at 6 pm (a little earlier than usual, so as not to hold it too near to Pesach which starts on April 1 this year). Jeannie Harrison, Phella Hirschson's daughter-in-law, has again very kindly agreed to host it at her home near Tel Aviv University, at 44 Tagore St., apt. 48, Tel Aviv. That's convenient both for buses and for the University train station. We hope to see as many of you there as possible!

As usual, we'll have an Open Mic session after concluding the business of the AGM. *Please register for attending the AGM with our secretary Pesach* (secretary.voices@gmail.com) not later than one week before, i.e. by March 13th, and also let him know if you would like to read one or at most (if time) two poems, not longer than one page each, at the Open Mic.

As I've mentioned several times, Wendy Blumfield is stepping down as Publicity Officer, and this will be announced at the AGM. We're still hoping someone will volunteer to help replace her. Do get in touch with me or with her if you'd like to hear more.

On to the Bar Sagi and Reuben Rose competitions! The Bar Sagi Young Poets' Prize has just closed for submissions, and we expect to announce the winners in a couple of weeks. As you know, the winners and Honourable Mention recipients of the Reuben Rose competition were announced last month. As usual, many of them are from abroad (Mark will give us an interesting breakdown of numbers at the AGM) so we're again holding the awards event by Zoom, combined with the awards event for the Bar Sagi prize. **We've fixed the date for the joint awards event for Sunday, April 30th, at 7 pm Israel time** (5 pm UK time, 12 noon US East Coast, 9 am US Pacific) and hope to "see" there as many of our members, from Israel and abroad, as possible.

The submission period for the Voices Israel Anthology closes in a couple of weeks! If you haven't done so yet, do select your best three poems to submit to it. Remember that the *only* way to submit is online via Submittable – click the Submit button at the bottom of the "Submitting To The Anthology" page of our website (https://www.voicesisrael.com/submitting-to-the-anthology). And do please read the submission guidelines, especially regarding maximum length of poems (41 lines, with long lines that overflow counted as two).



One of the most popular and long running programs at Netanya AACI is Poetry Please. I wanted to discover what it is about this program that attracts so many loyal participants, so I talked to Sue Lever, Carmel Miller, Phil Margolis and of course the facilitator extraordinaire, Susan Olsburgh.

They painted a picture of a dynamic, knowledgeable facilitator, who puts a great deal of effort into each and every session, ensuring that all participants feel equal and welcome. According to Carmel, over the 12 years of its existence, the program has evolved from six participants to the current 25-30, half of whom tune in on Zoom. Sue explained that Susan Olsburgh, sends out a booklet in advance, with the theme changing monthly. Participants are encouraged to participate and Susan spends hours online researching poems which she then forwards for inclusion in the program material.

During the session, different people read the poems and the program discusses it from a variety of perspectives. "She's amazing. The most wonderful facilitator. Susan makes everyone feel good. She's patient and encouraging" enthuses Carmel, who has been a loyal participant since the initial session. "I treasure going once a month and have missed only two programes in 12 years."

I asked Susan Olsburgh how the program got started. She said she'd taught literature in the UK and was also involved in Voices Israel, a creative writing group which she chaired for five years. Rachel asked if she would consider creating a program at Netanya AACI. Susan thought that sharing poetry would be enjoyable and how right she was!

She always starts with something from Tanach. The focus can also be on poetry



through the ages, the golden age of Spain, Hebrew poetry or local writers. Sometimes they listen to recordings of famous poets reading their own work. Some works are nostalgic, favorite childhood poetry. Some are more emotional such as poetry from the Shoah. The program then tries to figure out why a particular poem is so appealing. Program participants are challenged to think and explore and delve more deeply into the poetry.

Phil, one of the few males in the program, introduces humorous poetry such as Spike Milligan. "I'm often asked to read, which I enjoy since I was involved in dramatics." He echoes the enthusiasm of the other interviewees. "She's amazing. She has lots of experience and makes it a fun event. It's good for our community and good for people to get together."

All three interviewees agreed that what makes Susan so special is her ability to pitch each session in a way that regardless of one's background or interest, it will appeal to them. It's neither too academic nor too frivolous. No easy task! Susan is welcoming and open to what anyone has to say. She is patient and encouraging and makes everyone feel good.

Susan is always searching for ways to innovate. She has organized two trips – One to Bialik's home in Tel Aviv and another to Caesarea and Tiberias where they read Chana Senesh poetry on the beach and visited the grave of Naomi Shemer. Sometimes she invites guests. Susan praises Netanya AACI for their support, specifically their

efforts to keep the program going during Covid, by switching to Zoom. She loves the fact that lovely friendships have formed between people who share an interest in poetry. She concludes the interview by telling me, "The enthusiasm of the participants gives me a lot of satisfaction."

Well Susan, it's clear that the reverse is true and your participants want you to continue ועד מאה ועשרים

Let me add my appreciation on behalf of Netanya AACI for all you do!

I know I have seemed to forget all of you after I resigned as Secretary of Voices Israel. I must ask for your forgiveness.


On October 13, 2022, I underwent back surgery. All went very well until a week after the surgery when a dangerous infection developed in the surgical wound. I underwent three more surgeries to clean the wound and was in the hospital for over a month. The infection spread throughout my body which required that I be on a continuous infusion of antibiotics through a PICC line. I had excellent care both at the hospital (Beit Cholim Meir in Kfar Saba) and at home with my husband who did everything for me. I am happy to announce that I have recovered quite well up to this point. I walk in the home without a walking aide, but outside I use walking aides for now. The back pain I had been experiencing is gone. BH

I hope to see some of you at the AGM in Tel Aviv. I miss the connection we had when I was your secretary. I look forward to meeting anyone able to attend. And I send my sincerest thanks for those of you who were aware of my situation who contacted me or sent prayers for me. Sending my love and wishes for good health for all of you.

The Heartland Review is a biannual print literary journal published by the Creative Writing program at Elizabethtown Community and Technical College in Elizabethtown, Kentucky. *Submit three poems of any length or style to include traditional poetic forms.* Deadline is May 1. There is no fee to submit. Accepted authors in the U.S. receive one free copy of the journal; authors abroad must purchase through Amazon. Details at www.theheartlandreview.com/the-heartland-review.

Poetica Magazine is a journal of contemporary Jewish writing. It is published annually online, with the possibility that selected works might be published in a print edition as well. *Poetica Magazine seeks to publish poetry that exhibits both courage and nuance in its exploration of modern Jewish life, while simultaneously transcending any dichotomy between the secular and the sacred.* They are open for submissions from March 1 through August 31. Please submit one poem at a time; after you receive a reply, you may submit again. There is no fee for the first 250 submissions; after that, a fee of \$3 per submission. Able Muse is an annual print journal of metrical poetry. Submit one to five metrical poems (or one long poem), rhymed or unrhymed. (A poem of more than 40 lines is considered a "long" poem.) All types of formal poetry are welcome, from traditional to boundary-pushing. We want well-crafted poems that use meter skillfully and imaginatively (with rhyme or not), in a contemporary idiom that reads as naturally as free verse. Submission deadline is July 15. Submission is free. Simultaneous submissions are not permitted. Details are at www.ablemuse.com/submit/.

The Ocotillo Review is a biannual print journal based in Austin, Texas. Although we welcome experimental or unusual approaches to literature, our goal is to promote finely crafted work with an expressive and meaningful voice. We pay our contributors upon publication because we feel that too much art is taken for granted. Submit up to three poems of up to 65 lines each. There is no fee to submit. Deadline is March 31. The MSU Roadrunner Review is a biannual student-curated online literary journal out of the Creative Writing program at Metropolitan State University of Denver. Our focus is on quality prose and poetry, and submissions are open to all. There is no submission fee. Submission deadline is April 12. Shrapnel Magazine is a Canadian-run and internationally minded online literary journal. While we publish a variety of content, what sets us apart from most literary magazines is that we yearn for surreal, absurd, or humorous pieces. Submit up to five poems. There is no deadline. They request a donation of \$5 with every submission; in return, they provide feedback on every piece, even if it is not accepted, and they pay \$30 for every accepted poem plus an additional \$5 to writers who are able to record themselves reading their piece. Topical Poetry bills itself as *a global platform to share poems on current events*. It publishes online every other Sunday. Submissions are free, and always open.
