## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Poets,

Right at the end of December we received the tragic news that our Southern Group member, Judih Weinstein Haggai, and her husband Gad Haggai, were both murdered in the Hamas attack on October 7<sup>th</sup>. Previously they had been classified as "missing" but probably kidnapped to Gaza. Now their kibbutz, Nir Oz, has announced that this was not the case. We send our condolences to Judih and Gadi's family, and also to the members of our Southern Group who were her friends. May their memory be for a blessing.

We're planning a fitting memorial, such as a chapbook like the one Voices Israel issued a decade ago when our Upper Galilee member, Tom Berman, died in a hiking accident. I am currently in contact with Judih and Gadi's family about permission to issue such a chapbook and to include some of Judih's poems in it. If the family agrees, I'll be in touch with you all with a call for poems in Judih's memory for it. In addition, Dina has suggested dedicating the 2024 Anthology to Judih.

Looking forward to 2024, we welcome to our list of national officers our long-term Jerusalem member Bob Findysz, who will be taking over as our next secretary at the AGM, and our much newer Tiberias member, Julian Alper, who will be taking over as Newsletter Editor. Julian is perhaps best known for his Nature of Israel blog (https://natureofisrael.blogspot.com/). Like Bob, he'll overlap with Pesach for the next two or three months.

There's been a slight delay in the judging of the Reuben Rose competition: our International Judge was unable for personal reasons to continue and we had to find a replacement. Mark and I are grateful to Yvonne O'Connor of Ireland, who accepted the challenge. Hopefully she's nearly done: Mark will announce the results as soon as they're known.

The submission period for the 2024 Anthology opened on schedule on December 17<sup>th</sup>. As usual it will run for three months. So we all have time to wait and see if any of the poems submitted to the Reuben Rose competition won a prize or Honourable Mention. Those that didn't: submit the best three of them to the Anthology!

On December 4<sup>th</sup> we held another Zoom mini-workshop, "Broken Things," led by last year's Reuben Rose first-prize winner, Iris Dan. The date limit for sending me poems resulting from that workshop was the end of December, and after giving a grace period of a few days, I've started producing the chapbook from it. As usual for Zoom events, it will be an e-chapbook, distributed to participants as a PDF.

Meanwhile the submission period for the Bar Sagi Prize is ongoing, until the end of February. Please everyone who has any connection to English teacher or to teenagers who might want to enter, get the word out!

We still have no Publicity Officer. I'm therefore appealing to all our members: please publicize our events – e.g. now, the Bar Sagi Prize and the Voices Israel Anthology submission periods – in your Facebook pages, blogs, and other social media accounts. Spread the word!

## Statement from President Joe Biden on Judy Weinstein



Jill and I are devastated to learn that American Judy Weinstein is also believed to have been killed by Hamas on October 7. This tragic development cuts deep, coming on the heels of last week's news that Judy's beloved husband, Gad Haggai, is believed to have been killed by Hamas. We are holding Judy and Gad's four children, seven grandchildren, and other loved ones close to our hearts. I will never forget what their daughter, and the family members of other Americans held hostage in Gaza, have shared with me. They have been living through hell for weeks. No family should have to endure such an ordeal. And I reaffirm the pledge we have made to all the families of those still held hostage: we will not stop working to bring them home.



## YISKAH ROSENFELD'S NAKED BESIDE FISH TO BE RELEASED

Yiskah Rosenfeld's new book of ekphrastic poetry, *Naked Beside Fish*, is due to be released on March 15. You can pre-order at a reduced price until January 19 at www.finishinglinepress.com/product/naked-beside-fish-by-yiskah-rosenfeld/.

Naked Beside Fish locates itself firmly in the mystery of what lies between: between poetry and art, words and silence, the minutia of daily life and the infinite expansion of the cosmos. In this surreal space, inner and outer landscapes mirror and converge in surprising ways. Playfully structured around a museum exhibit, this ekphrastic chapbook takes us from art studios to camping under stars, from making mud soup at a children's museum to picking out paint colors in the kitchen. There is even an imagined art gallery translated into words, featuring paintings by Matisse, Picasso, and Chagall, as well as a "gift shop" appendix. With exquisite use of metaphor, color, and imagery, these poems pierce the heart, tunneling beneath the surface of life's canvas to name the emotions lurking beneath. The poet's background as a feminist scholar is evident here, daring to confront the challenges of solo parenting while exploring the complexities of the female body as simultaneous subject and object of a painter's gaze.

#### **Palette Poetry**

"Submissions for our Featured Poetry category are open year-round to poets at any stage of their careers. Featured poems are published online only and will spotlight a number of poems from new authors each month. We highly encourage emerging authors to submit." Length: Up to 5 poems, 10 pages (see guidelines)

Pay: \$50/poem, up to \$150

#### **Lowestoft Chronicle**

A long-running electronic literary journal. They publish a wide variety of genres but state, "Preference will be given to humorous submissions with an emphasis on travel." They publish "shorter" poetry and prose but they do prefer poetry to be over 100 words in length.

Deadline: Feb. 24, 2024. Submit via email, "one or two poems per submission window," including a brief bio. Simultaneous submissions accepted. Submission guidelines are at https://lowestoftchronicle.com/submissions/.

#### Terrain.org

They welcome submissions on place, climate, and justice – fiction (short story, flash fiction series, novel excerpt, radio play, or other fiction piece), nonfiction, **and poetry.** They also accept translations, and art. Payment is a minimum of \$50. And, "All accepted submissions by writers of color, members of the LGBTQ+ community, **women**, and/or other marginalized communities whose contributions explore place particularly in the context of social, environmental, or climate justice are considered for our annual Editor's Prize of \$500 per genre." Certain sections, like Letter to America and ArTerrain, are open year-round, and other sections have submission periods, or are open periodically.
